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BISHOP OUGH TO FOLLOW BISHOP DYCK

Bishop Bruce Ough will become bishop of the Minnesota Annual Conference and the Dakotas Annual Conference beginning Sept. 1, 2012.

The North Central Jurisdictional Episcopacy Com-

mittee announced this and other bishop assignments in the 11conference jurisdiction on July 19 in Akron, Ohio. They assigned Bishop Ough, who most recently oversaw the West Ohio

Annual Conference, to the new Dakotas-

Minnesota Episcopal Area. The conferences are not merging.

- "Bishop Ough and his wife Charlene will be a great addition to the Minnesota Annual Conference," said Judy Zabel, member of the North Central Jurisdiction Episcopacy Committee. "Bishop Ough has a proven track record of exemplary leadership. He has a heart for Jesus Christ, for sharing good news, and addressing issues of poverty. He is mission-minded and will lead by example."
- Bishop Ough was consecrated in 2000. As bishop he has served in the Ohio West Episcopal Area for three terms.
- Bishops are assigned for four-year terms. They may be assigned to the same area for a second consecutive term, and in rare cases may be assigned to the same area for three consecutive terms.

General Conference 2008 reduced the number of bishops per United States jurisdiction by one, effective 2012. The North Central College of Bishops determined in 2010 that the Dakotas and Minnesota, while remaining separate conferences, would share a bishop as one episcopal area. The West Michigan and Detroit Conferences currently share a bishop as separate conferences in one episcopal area.

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The primary office for the Dakotas-Minnesota Area will be in Minneapolis, for its proximity to the international airport. A transition team of representatives from both conferences have been meeting to plan how the conferences will effectively share a bishop.

Rev. Cindy Gregorson (director of ministries for Minnesota Conference) and Greg Kroger (Bishop's Assistant for Connectional Ministries for the Dakotas Conference) have been working together on the new bishop's schedule for his first twelve months in the area. **Opportunities to welcome the new bishop will be announced.**

The bishop assignments for the quadrennium beginning Sept. 1, 2012: Sally Dyck: Northern Illinois Episcopal Area; Michael Coyner: Indiana Episcopal Area; John Hopkins: Ohio East Episcopal Area; He-Soo Jung: Wisconsin Episcopal Area; Jonathan Keaton: Illinois Great Rivers Episcopal Area; Deborah Kiesey: Michigan/Detroit Episcopal Area; Bruce Ough: Dakotas/Minnesota Episcopal Area; Linda Lee: Retirement; Gregory Palmer: Ohio West Episcopal Area; and Julius Trimble: Iowa Episcopal Area.

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NURSES NOTES—The Gratitude Attitude

Gratitude. Thankfulness. Gratefulness. Appreciation. According to Wikipedia, all are a feeling, emotion or attitude in acknowledgment of a benefit that one has received or will receive. The following is an article by Pastor Rubel Shelby, written for Heartlight Magazine in November 2001. I wanted to share it with you... [NOTE: This article is centered around Thanksgiving, which is why it references Thursday.]

"The late A.W. Tozer once made this claim: "A thankful heart cannot be cynical." I suspect he is right. Living in a time so cynical as our own, it just may be that the doleful spirit of many — even in a time of great prosperity and blessing — has come about because of our failure to be grateful.

So I'm devoting the entire coming week to fostering a gratitude attitude. I resolve to obey the biblical call to "Give thanks in all circumstances." (1Thess. 5:18) and I'll not do it just on Thursday either, but all week long.

Just to be clear about the matter, I'm going to give thanks to God. I haven't created my own good fortune. Although I owe a lot to my family, even they are not the ultimate source of my blessings. Every good gift—whether delivered through country, church, friend, or family—is finally traceable to God's generosity.

Maybe you've heard the apocryphal story of the fifth-grader who, when asked to tell the origin of Thanksgiving Day in America, gave this politically sensitive account: "The Pilgrims came here seeking freedom of you-know-what. So, when they arrived, they gave thanks to you-know-who. Because of them, we can now worship without fear each Sunday at you-know-where."

> When you sit down with the people you love Thursday, give thanks in a specific

rather than generic way. Don't simply acknowledge the vague, warmfuzzies of a national holiday. Articulate your personal prayers of gratitude to God for his material gifts, for the important people he has put in your life, for his strength in your difficult times, for his Spirit-presence in your Christian life, and—above all—for the salvation he has provided through the Lord Jesus Christ.

I saw a cartoon years ago that featured a bewildered-looking fellow sitting at a Thanksgiving table loaded down with turkey, dressing, hot rolls and all the trimmings. The caption read: "Alvin the atheist realized he was at his lowest point, for he felt grateful but had no one to thank." A believer doesn't have that problem.

So why not join with me in the resolve I shared with you earlier? In getting ready for Thursday, let's live a gratitude attitude for the entire week. Co-workers today, family tonight, people who assist you at the post office or grocery, anyone who blesses your life—thank them sincerely for things that make your life better.

Who knows? Thanksgiving could become a way of life.

UMCOR Prayer Request

PRAYER: INTERNATIONAL AIDS CON-FERENCE

- Pray for the International AIDS Conference that is underway in Washington, DC, this week. Shannon Trilli, UM-COR health executive, was a part of the pre-planning session to help pave the way for the work of this meeting.
- Pray also for the Diecke Clinic in Guinea, which provides for people with HIV, AIDS, and malaria; supports maternal and child health; and provides other important community health services. The clinic receives important financial support from UMCOR and the Austin United Methodist District to accomplish its work.





UMCOR Updates

NEWS: THE FIRE WAS ANGRY

- Otto Braided Hair was a guarter-mile away from a towering wall of flame when suddenly the 50-mph wind changed direction, driving embers directly onto him and his volunteer firefighting crew. "When those embers blew over us, I got a sense that the fire was angry," he recalls.
- The wildfire—which started June 26 from a lightning strike-consumed one-quarter of the 440,000-acre Northern Cheyenne reservation in Montana, destroying 23 homes and leaving hundreds of others with smoke damage.
- Nearly a month after the fire, the reservation's 5,000 residents are struggling to begin their long-term recovery. In addition to families who lost their homes, many others lost vehicles, water access, fencing, and livestock.
- UMCOR is helping the Northern Cheyenne people begin their recovery with an emergency grant of \$10,000 for the Yellowstone Conference. These funds will help the Native American Ministries committee at the Sheridan United Methodist Church in Wyoming as it assesses needs and plans a long-term response.

NEWS: WESTERN WILDFIRES 'PROFOUND DISASTER' FOR MANY

- UMCOR is responding to wildfires that have destroyed a growing number of homes and forced thousands of people to evacuate throughout the western US. In Colorado, Montana, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming, and other states, churches are offering immediate care for evacuees even as they gather resources for long-term recovery.
- The United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR) has issued \$10,000 emergency grants to the Rocky Mountain, Yellowstone,

and New Mexico annual conferences.

- In New Mexico, where the Little Bear Fire destroyed or damaged at least 224 homes, the newly formed Little Bear Recovery Team has opened a center at which fire survivors can receive help. Within this ecumenical effort, United Methodists are leading a case management process under which more than 90 cases were opened on behalf of fire survivors as of early July.
- Meanwhile, hot spots continue to flare up as record drought lingers over a large portion of the US. "The heat is so intense that the fires literally ignite the inside of the house," said Knuckey. "It's a profound disaster."

NEWS: SOUTH SUDAN INDEPENDENCE DAY

- In July, while the people of the United States celebrate 236 years since the signing of the Declaration of Independence, the people of South Sudan mark an independence milestone: one year.
- It was on July 9, 2011, that South Sudan became an independent country, separate from Khartoum-ruled Sudan after a long, bloody war.
- The fledgling nation is beset by many challenges, not least those resulting from the years of conflict, which still flare today.
- The United Methodist Committee on Relief, present in South Sudan since 2006, has expanded

New Methods/New Day: Why Measure?

It's been six months since Minnesota United Methodist churches began reporting weekly statistical data to the denomination-wide Vital Congregations project. UM churches across the connection have set goals and are tracking progress in seven areas:

- 1. worship attendance
- 2. people received into membership by profession of faith
- 3. number of small groups
- 4. number of people participating in small groups
- 5. number of people engaged in service and outreach
- contributions for mission beyond the local church
- 7. contributions for local church ministry

"Why measure?"

The Vital Congregations Dashboard for collecting data is an intentional effort to:

- shift our mindset so that our primary focus and commitment is on fostering and sustaining congregational vitality
- articulate and commit to newly clarified and dramatically higher performance expectations for all levels of the church
- expect and provide courageous, accountable leadership that assumes responsibility for upsetting current paradigms and shaping and adopting new understandings that result in more effective practices, and
- institute and report measurable performance results in all sectors of the denomination on an ongoing and regular basis, enabling us to learn and adjust the ways we invest and use our talent, time, and money

New thinking for new results

As the Christian mainline has progressively

slipped to the sideline, it's clear we've got to do something different. Albert Einstein once said, "We can't solve problems by using the same kind of thinking we used when we created them."

- Instead of doing the same and getting more of the same, turning sights toward goal setting and performance tracking provides the necessary framework for a church to move toward its preferred future. It's a discipline that compels us to prayerfully discern where God is calling us and faithfully follow where God is leading us.
- Consistent recording and frequent reporting focuses our attention on what we're counting and encourages and cultivates more of the fruitful practices we are measuring. With goals come strategies for achieving those goals.
- As members of the United Methodist Church, we pledge to faithfully participate in ministries of our church by our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. In turn, churches commit to providing the resources and the vehicle for fulfilling this pledge. At the core of our Wesleyan tradition is holding one another accountable to these vows in Christian love. The first step in being *accountable* is to secure *a count* to be *able* to know where we are and where we need to grow.
- Minnesota's goals, the sum of all local church goals submitted, over the next five years will return us to the strength of United Methodist work and witness that existed five years ago. It may not sound like much, but if each church individually meets its goals, then collectively, we will boldly reverse a two-generation-long trend of decline!

TECHNOLOGY GRANT FACILITATES COMBINED DAKOTA-MINNESOTA EPISCOPAL AREA

- The new Dakotas-Minnesota Episcopal Area receives a \$125,000 grant from the conferences of the North Central Jurisdiction to expand video conferencing system in the Dakotas and Minnesota Conferences.
- "The video conferencing technology will be a quantum leap forward in using technology for training, meetings, and more," said Cindy Gregorson, conference director of ministries. "It will make it much more accessible for people to work collaboratively and serve in annual conference leadership as well as allow our bishop to have face to face time with laity and clergy in a

cost and time effective way given the geographical size of the Dakotas-Minnesota Episcopal Area."

The North Central Jurisdictional Conference, held July 17-20 in Akron, Ohio, approved a budget that included the video conferencing grant

for the Dakotas-Minnesota episcopal area.

- The Transition Team for the new episcopal area requested the grant to assist the bishop of the new area to lead an area that is almost the size of Texas. The Dakotas Conference has already been effectively using a video conferencing system, dubbed DAVID. "... we appreciate that the burdens and costs of this decision will be borne by the entire jurisdiction," said Gregorson.
- "Videoconferencing is an effective and efficient way to do God's work," says Doreen Gosmire, Associate Director of Communications for the Dakotas Conference. "It allows people who perhaps could not find the time or money to travel to conference business meetings a chance to participate.
- Gosmire, who has been running the DAVID system in the Dakotas Conference, says the system saves time and money. "The average costs savings per meeting by video conference is \$2,500 due to money not spent on travel, lodging and

meals," Gosmire said.

- Minnesota has access to the Dakotas DAVID system via a "bridge," in the conference office in Minneapolis. The Transition Team, made up of representatives of both conferences, have used the system to plan for the new bishop, saving hours of work time and funds that might have been spent on travel, fuel and overnight accommodations.
- "The system works like a telephone call with video," Gosmire said. "You can talk with each other and see each other in real time. Videos,

information on a computer, and images can also be shared during a video call. A video conference can be recorded and then viewed at another time, and it is possible to broadcast the video call over the Internet so that anyone on the Internet can view a meeting. The oppor-

tunities to do ministry in this new and innovative way are vast."

- Barb Carroll, director of finance and administration for Minnesota conference and transition team member, says there are currently 5 sites in the Dakotas and one trial site in Minneapolis. These funds will allow the conferences to establish four additional sites in Minnesota over the next 18 months.
- "This technology will be initially most helpful to our bishop because he can connect with the superintendents of the conference for cabinet meetings or consultations, no matter where he is at the moment" Gregorson said. "It also allows him to join a meeting from wherever he may be. As the system expands in Minnesota, we expect it to be used by many of our ministry teams to save on travel time for meetings, and for allowing us to create satellite venues for speakers and training events."

2013 MN Conference Budget Smaller Than 2012 Budget

The 2013 annual conference budget comes to just over \$6.2 million, \$130,000 lower than the 2012 budget and at "ceiling" (maximum allowed by conference rules). It's at the same level as the 2003 budget and continues a trend of declining budgets. Apportionment dollars make missions like Imagine No Malaria possible, said Barbara Carroll, director of finance and administration, because they fund essential accountability processes. They also make available clergy benefits and resources for church health.

The Church Council has reviewed the Crisis Fund and adopted a written policy which includes an "annual gift" limit and clarification that the Pastor is the only individual to know who receives any assistance. Please contact Pastor Victor if you are interested in more information.

CAMP DECISIONS MADE

- Star Lake Wilderness Camp (Pequot Lakes), vigorously advocated for by a number of its users, has a chance at an existence independent of the Minnesota Annual Conference.
- Session members approved the Retreats and Camping Ministry Team's request to divest of Camp Kingswood (Mound) in order to alleviate the conference camping ministry's debt and invest funds into an improved camping program that would more effectively reach children and youth.
- They also approved an amendment that removed Star Lake from divestment. Instead, they authorized the conference Board of Trustees, in consultation with RCMT, to "negotiate, if possible, an arrangement for Star Lake Wilderness Camp to operate as a new entity that is separate from RCMT with no annual conference support."
- Session members asked for hard details on the arrangement, but the Trustees and the amendment author, Walter Lockhart (Walker Community United Methodist Church, Minneapolis), explained that this is simply authorization for negotiation, without obligation from either Star Lake or the conference trustees to accept an arrangement.
- RCMT had asked the conference to agree to divest of both properties to fund an improved Christian residential camping program for youth and children at Northern Pines (Park Rapids) and Koronis Ministries (Paynesville). These two sites seem most suited accommodate the RCMT plan to draw as many children as possible to a faith-building camp experience.
- Matt Sipe (Delano UMC) said the RCMT's vision is 152 children a week at summer camps, where participants deepen faith, build selfconfidence and leadership skills, and mature in a faith that sustains them for life.
